TREE MAINTENANCE

REFERENCE:

CSH&WSA Document No. 14 – Hazard Management Procedure

OBJECTIVE:

To ensure worksites are aware of the dangers associated with falling tree branches

BACKGROUND:

A private school outside the Catholic Church Licence has recently been prosecuted as a result of a tree branch falling resulting in 3 people being severely injured.

Recently we have had two incidents at our sites where tree branches have fallen, however no one was injured.

PREVENTATIVE ACTIONS:

- ldentify any tree at your site that has the potential to drop a branch that may cause an injury to any person.
- Complete a documented risk assessment on any identified tree that may require the services of an Arborist.

Issues to look for:

- Have any branches fallen from the tree?
- Are there large dead branches in the tree?
- Are there detached branches hanging in the tree?
- Does the tree have cavities or rotten wood along the trunk or in major branches?
- Are mushrooms present at the base of the tree?
- Are there cracks or splits in the trunk or where branches are attached?
- Have adjacent trees fallen over or died?
- Has the trunk developed a strong lean?

- Do many of the major branches arise from one point on the trunk?
- Have the roots been broken off, injured, or damaged by lowering the soil level, installing pavement, repairing sidewalks, or digging trenches?
- Has the site recently been changed by construction, raising the soil level, or installing lawns?
- Have the leaves prematurely developed an unusual colour or size?
- Have trees in adjacent wooded areas been removed?
- Has the tree been topped or otherwise heavily pruned?
- If any tree/s has been identified as hazardous enlist the services of an Arborist to inspect the tree/s and provide a written report and thereafter once every twelve months have the Arborist inspect and provide a written reports.
- Ensure the Workplace Inspection Checklist has been modified to incorporate the checking of trees if applicable to your site.
- Inform staff to be aware of, and report, any suspect looking tree branches.
